1. Honey Pear Sauce

7 -1/2 lbs. (3.4 kg) medium ripe pears

1 cup (250 ml) honey

1 tsp (5 ml) grated orange rind

1/2 tsp (2 ml) grated nutmeg

Directions

Place 7 clean 250 ml mason jars on a rack in a boiling water canner. Cover jars with water and heat to a simmer (180°F/82°C).

Set screw bands aside. Keep jars hot until ready to use. Wash and coarsely chop pears. Place in large, deep stainless-steel saucepan. With a large spoon or potato masher, crush pears to release juice. Bring to a boil; cover and reduce heat. Stirring occasionally, simmer about 20 minutes or until pears are soft. Pour cooked pears through a fine sieve, pressing with spoon to yield 10 cups (2.5 L).

Purée pear sauce in food processor. (The purée step creates a silky-smooth texture. If a more textured spread is desired, skip this step.)

Return purée or strained pears to saucepan; stir in grated orange rind and nutmeg. Stirring occasionally, bring to a boil; reduce heat and boil gently 45 minutes. Add honey; return mixture to a boil;. boil gently again about 20 minutes or until Pear Honey mounds on a spoon or reaches desired thickness. Ladle hot pear honey into a hot jar to within 1/4 inch (0.5 cm) of top of jar(headspace). Using nonmetallic utensil, remove air bubbles and adjust headspace, if required, by adding more pear honey. Wipe jar rim removing any food residue. Centre hot sealing disc on clean jar rim. Screw band down until resistance is met, then increase to fingertip tight. Return filled jar to rack in canner. Repeat for remaining pear honey. When canner is filled, ensure that all jars are covered by at least one inch (2.5 cm) of water. Cover canner and bring water to full rolling boil before starting to count processing time. At altitudes up to 1000 ft (305 m), process -boil filled jars - 10 minutes.

When processing time is complete, remove canner lid, wait 5 minutes, then remove jars without tilting and place them upright on a protected work surface. Cool upright, undisturbed 24

Elegant Apricot Preserves

Delight the judges with this elegant apricot preserve recipe

Ingredients:

5 cups (1250 ml) prepared fresh apricots, about 28-30 or 4 lb (1.8kg)

2 cups (500 ml) prepared tart apples, about 4

2 cups (500 ml) granulated sugar

1/2 cup (125 ml) liquid honey

2 tbsp (30 ml) lemon juice

1 cup (250 ml) brandy, optional

Directions:

Pit and slice apricots. Measure 5 cups (1250 ml) and set aside.

Peel, core and chop apples. Measure 2 cups (500 ml).

Combine apricots, apples, sugar, honey, and lemon juice in a large stainless-steel saucepan. Let stand 40 minutes.

Place 6 clean 250 ml mason jars on a rack in a boiling water

canner. Cover jars with water and heat to a simmer (180°F/82°C). Set screw bands aside. Keep jars hot until ready to use. Bring fruit mixture to a full boil, stirring constantly to prevent scorching. Boil gently, uncovered, or until mixture thickens and reaches gel stage, about 20 to 30 minutes. (Gel Plate Test: remove mixture from heat; pour a spoonful of cooked recipe on a cold plate and place in freezer for a few minutes. A gel has been achieved when the product does not run together when separated with a spoon). Remove from heat and skim foam. If using brandy, stir in and return preserves to heat. Boil 5 minutes longer, stirring constantly.

Quickly ladle hot preserves into a hot jar to within 1/4 inch (0.5 cm) of top of jar (headspace). Using nonmetallic utensil, remove air bubbles and adjust headspace, if required, by adding more preserves. Wipe jar rim removing any food residue. Centre hot sealing disc on clean jar rim. Screw band down until resistance is met, then increase to fingertip tight. Return filled jar to rack in canner. Repeat for remaining preserves.

When canner is filled, ensure that all jars are covered by at least one inch (2.5 cm) of water. Cover canner and bring water to full rolling boil before starting to count processing time. At altitudes up to 1000 ft (305 m), process –boil filled jars – 10 minutes. When processing time is complete, remove canner lid, wait 5 minutes, then remove jars without tilting and place them upright on a protected work surface. Cool upright, undisturbed 24 hours; DO NOT RETIGHTEN screw bands.

Shortbread crust:

1 cup unsalted butter, softened

1/3 cup sugar

1/3 cup brown sugar, packed

1 large egg yolk

3/4 tsp vanilla extract

1/2 tsp salt

2 1/4 cup all-purpose flour

Caramel:

2, 14-oz cans sweetened condensed milk

14 tbsp unsalted butter, cut into tablespoon-sized pieces

1 cup sugar packed

1/3 cup light corn syrup

3/4 tsp salt

1 tsp vanilla

Chocolate Ganache

2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

1/2 cup whipping cream

Sea salt for sprinkling

Heat oven to 350°F. Line 13x9-inch baking pan with parchment paper.

- Beat butter until well creamed. Add sugars and beat until light and fluffy.
- Add egg yolk and vanilla extract and stir well, mixing until well-combined.
- 3. Add flour, gradually (about ½ cup at a time). Halfway through the addition of the flour, sprinkle in the salt with the beater still running. Dough should be slightly crumbly.
- Drop dough into prepared pan and press into the bottom of the pan. Bake for 20-25 minutes. Edges should be golden brown. Allow to cool.
- Combine condensed milk, butter, brown sugar, corn syrup and salt in medium-sized saucepan over medium heat.
- Stir frequently until butter is melted and ingredients are well-combined. Continue to stir constantly until mixture begins to boil.
- Once mixture comes to a boil, reduce to a simmer and continue stirring. Stir for 10-15 minutes until a rich caramel colour and thickened.
- Remove from heat and immediately stir in the vanilla extract.
- Pour over the prepared shortbread. Allow to cool before topping with ganache.
- Combine chocolate chips and whipping cream in small saucepan until over low heat. Stir frequently until chocolate is melted and mixture is smooth.
- 11. Allow chocolate to cool for about 5 minutes and spread evenly over caramel layer. Wait several minutes for chocolate to begin to set and then sprinkle with sea salt. Allow chocolate to harden before cutting.
