8 cups plum tomatoes --puree

1 1/4 cup green pepper --puree

1 cup onions --puree

2 large cloves garlic minced

1 tablespoon mustard seed

1/2 tablespoon celery seed

1 dried chilies

3/4 cup molasses

3/4 cup vinegar

1/3 cup worcestershire sauce

2 tablespoon chili powder

2 teaspoon ground black pepper

Wash skin and puree tomatoes bring to a boil and cook until reduced by half.

Add pureed peppers and onions garlic mustard and celery seed and dried chili.

Return to boil and cook for 10 minutes.

Add remaining 5 ingredients and cook for about 45 minutes or until it starts to thicken.

Ladle into sterilized jars and seal

Jars to be 250ml

Bloom'in Strawberry Jam

crushed strawberries (about 1 pint)

3 cups granulated sugar

2/3 cup pineapple juice

1/3 cup lime juice

1 pouch of liquid pectin

1/4 cup rum or orange juice can be substitute for the rum

Wash, hull and crush strawberries.

Combine crush strawberries pineapple lime juices, add sugar and whisk until dissolved.

Stirring frequently, bring mixture to a boil ,remove from heat and add the rum or orange which ever you are using.

Stir in pectin. Cook for 5 minutes.

Remove from heat. Skim foam. Ladle into hot sterilized jars.

Makes 4 cups.

39. Barn Raising Summer Fruit Jam

5 tart apples

2 cups of water

1 lemon (lemon peeled and juice saved)

4 cups strawberries

5 1/2 cups sugar

Wash peel and core apples cook in the 2 cups of water with the peel off the lemon. Cook for 20 minutes. Remove the lemon peel and mash the apples until the consistent of apple sauce.

Add washed cored mashed strawberries to apples sauce and return the lemon peel bring to a boil.

Stir sugar slowly into the apple strawberry mixture stirring frequently to prevent scorching boil vigorously until mixture reaches gel stage (gel stage has been reached when a small amount is put on cold plate and doesn't run together when separated with a spoon).

Boil hard for 1 minute add the juice from the lemon and boil for 1 more minute remove the lemon peel.

Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

40. Diabetic Apple Jam

- 6 cups chopped peeled firm apples
- 2 cups unsweetened apple juice
- juice and zest of 1 grated lemon
- 3 inch stick of cinnamon
- 1 package of no sugar pectin
- 3/4 cup frozen or fresh cranberries
- 1 1/2 cups splenda no calorie sweetener
- 1/2 teaspoon of butter

In a large deep stainless steel saucepan combine apples - apple juice-lemon juice and zest- cinnamon stick and simmer for several minutes just till apples are begin to soften -- remove from heat-- gradually add pectin until dissolved --add cranberries and the 1/2 teaspoon of butter (to reduce foaming) return to heat boil for 3 minutes--add the sweetener - - boil 2 more minutes remove from heat discard cinnamon stick and skim off foam-- seal in jars

Concord Grape jam

- 3 quarts fully ripe concord grapes
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 ground cloves
- 7 1/2 cups white sugar
- 1 pouch of liquid fruit pectin

Slip skins from grapes add 1/2 cup water to pulp bring to a boil and simmer covered for 5 minutes.

Sieve to remove seeds chop skins finely and add to pulp.

Measure 5 cups of prepared grapes into a large saucepan with white sugar and spices.

Bring to a full rolling boil-- boil hard for 1 minute stirring constantly. Remove from heat and immediately.

Add fruit pectin, skim off foam and pour into warm sterilized jars and seal.

- Wash and chop rhubarb finely add pineapple bring to a full boil -- add sugar and mix well -boil hard for 1 minute --take off heat stir in liquid pectin -- skim of foam with a metal spoon-- ladle into sterilized jars and seal.

- 4 cups finely chopped peeled peaches

- 1 to 1/2 teaspoons cumin

Combine peaches onions peppers cilantro garlic cumin lemon peel and vinegar in large saucepan set aside.

Mix 1/4 cup of the sugar and the pectin add to peaches mixture and blend well.

Bring to full rolling boil on high heat stirring constantly still in remaining sugar 3 1/2 cup return to full boil and boil 1 min remove from heat stir and skim off the foam for 5 mins to prevent the fruit from floating.

Pour into warm sterilized jars and seal

- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4 cups chopped walnuts

In a microwave or heavy saucepan, melt butter and chocolate; stir until smooth. Cool slightly. In a bowl, beat eggs and sugar; stir in vanilla and chocolate mixture. Stir in flour until well blended. Pour into a greased 13 in. x 9 in. x 2 in. baking pan; set aside.

For topping, in a saucepan, combine brown sugar and butter. Cook and stir over low heat until butter is melted. Stir in the

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eggs, flour and vanilla until well blended. Stir in nuts. Spread evenly over brownie batter. Bake at 350°F for 40-45 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the centre comes out with moist crumbs (do no overbake). Cool completely on a wire rack. Yield: 1-1/2 dozen.

Chocolate Magic Bars

Base:

2 cups coconut, toasted

2 cups oats

1/2 cup golden yellow sugar

1/2 cup butter, melted

Topping:

1 1/2 cups chopped salted almonds or mixed nuts, toasted

2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

1 1/2 cups milk chocolate chips

2 cans condensed milk

Preheat over to 350°F. Butter the bottom and sides of a 9" x 13" baking dish. Line with parchment paper, overlapping the 2 longer sides for easy removal.

Base: In a large bowl add toasted coconut, oats and sugar.

Toss to combine. Pour in butter and stir to combine. Press the crust into an even layer on the bottom and up the sides of the

prepared dish. Bake in preheated oven 18-20 minutes until golden brown.

Topping: Sprinkle nuts over the warmed crust. Cover nuts with chocolate chips. Pour sweetened condensed milk evenly over the filling.

Return to oven and bake for 30-35 minutes, until golden brown and bubbly. Cool in refrigerator until cold, about 4 hours or overnight before cutting into squares.

A. Crunchy Nut Date Squares

Filling:

1 lb pitted and chopped dates (about 3 cups)

1 cup corn syrup

1/2 cup water

1/4 cup packed dark brown sugar

1/4 cup lemon juice

1 cup chopped almonds, pecans or walnuts, toasted

Base & Topping:

1 cup butter, softened

1 1/2 cups packed dark brown sugar

2 cups All-purpose flour

2 cups flaked oats

1/2 tsp each baking soda and salt

Preheat oven to 350°F. Lightly grease and line a 9" x 13" baking dish with parchment paper, overlapping 2 sides for easy removal.

Filling: Combine, in a medium saucepan, dates, corn syrup, water, sugar and lemon juice. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, stirring often, until thickened, about 10 minutes. This will make about 3 cups of filling. Cool for 15 minutes. Stir in nuts.

Base & Topping: Cream, in a medium bowl, butter and sugar. Add remaining dry ingredients. Mixture may be a bit crumbly. Reserve 2 cups for topping.

Pat remaining mixture onto bottom of prepared dish. Spread cooled date mixture over base. Sprinkle remaining 2 cups of dry mixture.

Bake in preheated oven for 25 to 30 minutes, or until top is golden brown. Chill 2 to 3 hours and cut into squares.

(To toast nuts, heat oven to 350 °F and bake for 10 minutes)

- C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Hand/Machine Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
- D. Upon making entry into the OAAS Hand/Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- E. The winning OAAS Hand/Machine Quilted Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS Provincial competition.
- F. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
- G. Machine-Quilted Quilt must have visible machine quilting.

LOCAL FAIR COMPETITIONS
