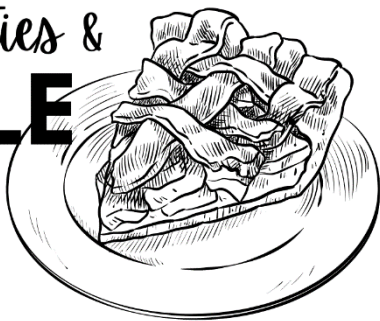

1. New Exhibitor Special – Caesar's Hot Pickled Beans

2.2 lb (1 kg) green beans

2.2 lb (1 kg) yellow waxed beans

2 large red peppers, seeded

3 cups (750 ml) white vinegar

3 cups (750 ml) water

6 tsp (30 ml) crushed red pepper or 6-18 hot chili peppers

18 peppercorns

3 tsp (15 ml) dill seed

6 large cloves garlic, halved

3 tbsp pickling salt

Method

1. Sterilize 6 half pint jars and lids. While jars are being sterilized, stir together vinegar, water, and salt in a large saucepan. Add garlic and bring to a rolling boil over high heat.
2. Trim green beans to 1/4-inch shorter than the jars.
3. Remove jars from simmering water. Place 1 sprig of dill and 1/8 teaspoon red pepper flakes in each jar. Pack in green beans standing on end.

4. Ladle boiling brine (leave out garlic) into the jars, filling within 1/4-inch of the tops. Seal jars with lids and rings.
5. Place a rack in the bottom of a large stockpot and fill halfway with water. Bring to a boil and lower jars 2 inches apart into the boiling water using a holder. Pour in more boiling water to cover jars by at least 1 inch. Bring to a simmer (do not boil), cover, and process for 10 minutes.
6. Remove jars from the stockpot and cool to room temperature, 8 to 12 hours. Test jars for a good seal by pressing on the center of the lid — it should not move.
7. Let green beans ferment for 2 to 3 weeks in a cool, dark space before eating.
8. If any jars do not seal properly, refrigerate and eat those beans within a week.

42. MORRISON BERRIES JAM SPECIAL - Jars to be 250ml
Sweet n' Savoury Strawberry Balsamic Jam

3-3/4 cups crushed strawberries (about 4 pints)

3 tbsp balsamic vinegar

1 tbsp lemon juice

Grated zest of 1 lemon

6 1/2 cups granulated sugar

1/4 – 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper

1 pouch liquid pectin

1. Wash, hull and crush strawberries one layer at a time. Measure prepared fruit into a large, deep stainless steel saucepan.
2. Stir in vinegar, lemon juice and zest, sugar and pepper. Add 1/2 tsp (2 ml) butter or margarine (to reduce foaming). Over high heat, bring mixture to a full rolling boil that cannot be stirred down.
3. Add liquid pectin, squeezing entire contents from pouch. Return to boil; boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and skim off foam if necessary.
4. Quickly ladle hot jam into hot, sterilized jars to within 1/4 inch (0.5 cm) of top of jar (headspace). Using nonmetallic utensil, remove air bubbles and adjust headspace, if required, by adding more jam. Wipe jar rim removing any food residue. Add lids and screw caps, then place jars in canner.
5. When canner is filled, ensure that all jars are covered by at least one inch (2.5 cm) of water. Cover canner and bring water to full rolling boil before starting to count processing time. Process 10 minutes.

Pickled Beets & Onions

8 cups (2000 ml) prepared beets, about 4 lb (1.8 kg) (any kind or colour)

3 cups (750 ml) sliced onions, about 3 medium

2 -1/2 cups (625 ml) cider vinegar

2 cups (500 ml) granulated sugar

1 -1/2 cups (375 ml) water

1 tbsp (15 ml) mustard seed

1 tsp (5 ml) each: salt, whole allspice and whole cloves

6 inch (15 cm) cinnamon stick

1. Scrub beets and trim all but 2 inches (5 cm) off stems; do not cut off roots. Cook beets in boiling water, until tender, about 35 to 45 minutes. Remove from water and allow to cool slightly. Remove skins by easily slipping off beets. Cut into large chunks and measure 8 cups (2000 ml); set aside.
2. Combine onions, vinegar, sugar, water, mustard seed, salt, allspice, cloves and cinnamon sticks in a large stainless steel saucepan. Bring to a boil; boil gently 5 minutes. Add beets and return to a full boil. Remove from heat. Discard cinnamon sticks.
3. Pack beets into a hot 500 ml jar to within 3/4 inch (2 cm) of top of jar. Add hot liquid to cover beets to within 1/2 inch (1 cm) of top of jar (headspace). Using nonmetallic utensil, remove air bubbles and adjust headspace, if required, by adding more beets and hot liquid. Wipe jar rim removing any food residue. Centre hot sealing disc on clean jar rim. Screw band down until resistance is met, then increase to fingertip tight. Return filled jar to rack in canner. Repeat for remaining beets and hot liquid.
4. When canner is filled, ensure that all jars are covered by at least one inch (2.5 cm) of water. Cover canner and bring water to full rolling boil before starting to count processing time. Process for 30 minutes.
5. When processing time is complete, remove canner lid, wait 5 minutes, then remove jars without tilting and place them upright on a protected work surface. Cool upright, undisturbed 24 hours.
6. Label and store jars in a cool, dark place. For best quality, use home canned foods within one year.

49. TWO BIRDS ONE STONE – GARLIC LOVER AWARD**Pickled Garlic**

4 cups peeled garlic cloves

2 cups white vinegar 5% acidity

1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 teaspoon pickling salt

1 teaspoon pickling spices - exhibitor's choice of spices

1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes

Method

Prepare the garlic:

1. Remove garlic cloves from the bulb, trim off the root end, peel,

and measure 4 cups of peeled garlic.

Make the Pickling Brine:

1. Add the vinegar, sugar, salt, and spices to a medium pot. While stirring, bring to a boil over medium-high heat, and boil for 1 minute.
2. Add the prepared garlic and boil for an additional 1 minute. Keep hot as you fill the jars.

Can the Pickled Garlic:

1. Use a slotted spoon to pack the garlic into hot, sterilized jars. Ladle the hot brine over the garlic, leaving 1/2 inch of headspace. Ensure all cloves are submerged.
2. Once the jars are in the canner, adjust the water level to be 2-inches above the tops of the jars. Process 10 minutes.

50. HIVE N' HOE – APPLE PIES AND FAMILY TIES PRIZE

Jar size to be 1 L

Apple Pie Filling

4 ½ cups white sugar

1 cup cornstarch

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg

10 cups water

2 teaspoons salt

3 tablespoons lemon juice

6 pounds apples

Method

1. Mix sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon, and nutmeg in a large pan. Add water and salt and mix well. Bring to a boil and cook until thick and bubbly. Remove from heat and add lemon juice and food coloring.
2. Peel, core, and slice apples. Pack the sliced apples into hot, sterilized canning jars, leaving a 1/2 inch of headspace.
3. Fill jars with hot syrup, and gently remove air bubbles with a knife.
4. Put lids on and process in a water bath canner for 20 minutes.

 - 2/3 cup all-purpose flour
 - 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup pecan pieces Caramel

Topping (recipe follows)

 1. Heat oven to 350°F. Line 9-inch square baking pan with foil, extending foil over edges of pan. Grease and flour foil.
 2. Combine sugar, butter and water in medium saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly; until mixture boils. Remove from heat. Immediately add 1 cup chocolate chips; stir until melted. Beat in eggs and vanilla until well blended. Stir together flour, baking soda and salt; stir into chocolate mixture. Spread batter into prepared pan.

3. Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until brownies begin to pull away from sides of pan. Meanwhile, prepare Caramel Topping. Remove brownies from oven; immediately and carefully spread with prepared topping. Sprinkle remaining 1 cup chips and pecans over topping. Cool completely in pan on wire rack, being careful not to disturb chips while soft. Lift out of pan. Cut into bars.

CARAMEL TOPPING: Remove wrappers from 25 caramels candies. Combine 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, caramels and 1/2 tablespoon milk in medium microwave-safe bowl. Microwave at HIGH (100%) 1 minute; stir. Microwave an additional 1 to 2 minutes, stirring every 30 seconds, or until caramels are melted and mixture is smooth when stirred. Use immediately.

Nutty Applesauce Bread

1/3 cup shortening

1/2 cup sugar

1 egg

1 cup applesauce

1 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1 tbsp baking powder

1/2 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp nutmeg

1 cup nuts, finely chopped

Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease a 9" inch loaf pan. Cream shortening and sugar in a large bowl at medium to high speed. Beat in egg. Stir in applesauce with spoon. Combine flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Stir into creamed mixture with spoon. Fold in nuts. Spoon into pan. Bake at 350 for 45-50 minutes or until golden brown. Cool for 10 minutes in pan on rack. Loosen from sides and remove from pan. Cool completely on rack.

- B. Quilt to be measured on the perimeter. **Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches.** Note: the quilt can be square, rectangular etc.
- C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Hand/Machine Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
- D. Upon making entry into the OAAS Hand/Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- E. The winning OAAS Hand/Machine Quilted Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS Provincial competition.
- F. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
- G. Machine-Quilted Quilt must have visible machine quilting.

Provincial Competition

- Maple syrup exhibits shall consist of two (2) curved Kent style glass bottles (D&G #505188 Syrup Bottle with Handle), or equivalent, of Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A - Amber, each having a capacity of 250 mL.
- Entries must be labeled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.
- All maple syrup should have a flavour characteristic of its respective colour class and be free from any objectionable odour or taste.
- Any maple syrup entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.
- An approved maple syrup colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.
- Maple syrup will be judged using the standards published by the OAAS in Agriculture & Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs.
- It is a condition of entry that all maple syrup products entered become property of the OAAS. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention.
- Judging Standards – 100 Total - 30 Density, 40 Flavour, 20 Colour, 10 Clarity
